Wide World of Hickory – 2019

A summary of world hickory golf events.

Europe and Australia

We are grateful to the various scribes of the British Golf Collectors Society and other European hickory organizers whose reports on several European hickory championships were the basis for the following brief summaries of these events. MARCH

15 – BGCS, Match v. Royal Worlington & Newmarket GC

Nigel Notley reports: It is always a pleasure to start the season at Worlington. It is a renowned winter course based in the Suffolk Brecks sand belt. The weather was dry, and the course was by general agreement in very good shape. The greens were very true and fine and the new teeing grounds very level and tight with fine fescue. Fairways were dry but still suffering from last year's drought. The turnout was excellent with the maximum of 12 a side for this foursomes match over Worlington's Sacred Nine. For the BGCS we were delighted to welcome back Tony Norcott in his official capacity as Captain of the society together with debut's for Alan Walmsley, Andrew Holbrook and Willie Dunn, whose relative Tom Dunn, designed the original 1893 lay out. That the original holes are largely unaltered is testament to Tom Dunn's vision in using the natural contours and Tom Hood who did the construction in the early 90's and again in 1920-23. The match was very close but won by the Worlington team.

APRIL

12-14 – Welsh Weekend

Day One – Borth & Ynyslas GC

The weekend began with a warm welcome at Borth & Ynyslas GC. Thirty-seven Society golfers were joined by five Borth members including both Captains, Vice Captain and President. The cool, sunny weather and a fresh breeze combined with a dry, fast running course provided excellent conditions for hickory golf. Indeed, for some Society stalwarts it was their first experience of sunshine south of the Dyfi estuary! Liz MacDonald stepped in to complete the final team of three, an inspired substitution which led in no small way to the team's victory in the event. Team member Ulf Jagaeus took the scratch prize, guest Ben Shelford completing the line up. In the individual nett competition, Borth & Ynyslas Captain

Day 2 - Match with Aberdovey GC for the Darwin Trophy

Match result: Aberdovey GC lost to BGCS by 18 holes up to two. Weather conditions very similar to the previous day south of the estuary and a record field of 16 matches. Five Society members supplemented the Club team.

Although eight of the matches were halved, four substantial victories for the Society contributed to the final result of eighteen holes up to two holes up in favour of the Society. As has become customary, Gwyn James, past Captain and recently President of the Club, sang a number of songs associated with Aberdovey in both Welsh and English, much to the delight of the seventy five golfers and guests at dinner.

Day 3 – The 19th Welsh Hickory Championship

Sunday, 14th April dawned cloudy and cold with a brisk east wind blowing the players out for the first nine and making the back nine very difficult. After a dry period the fairways were running well and greens very slick, which would normally be perfect for hickory play, except that controlling the ball was quite a challenge. No rain, though, which was a real bonus!

Congratulations to Jenny Hunt, the first lady winner of the 'Welsh', and to Claes Arma on winning the Scratch trophy for the first time after coming close in previous years. Peggy Burles presented the Peter Burles Trophy to Jenny and our Captain, Tony Norcott, returning to Aberdovey after an absence of 20 years, was on hand to congratulate all the participants.

MAY

18 – BGCS Hickory Match vs Royal Liverpool Golf Club, 150th Celebration Bob Chadwick reports:

The dates for President's Day and the Match were fixed so that they followed shortly after the actual 150th anniversary of the founding meeting of the Liverpool Golf Club which was held on 15th May 1869 in the Royal Hotel, Hoylake. Part of that building (across the road from what is now the 17th green and 18th tee) became the clubhouse for the first 26 years of the golf club's life until the present clubhouse was opened in 1895.

Royal Liverpool entertained us to a match of 24 per side, each including four ladies, followed by aperitifs and an excellent lunch - gratis for the participants which is a very tangible demonstration of the esteem in which the BGCS is held at RLGC.

Tony Hunt supplied sets of hickories to the home club players and some were seen keenly practicing with them while we were playing our President's Day round on Friday 17th. The home club players all dressed suitably for the occasion, in particular the ladies who hired Victorian outfits with long skirts

and boater hats. Some of the club Juniors acted as caddies and were also dressed for the part in theatrical hire costumes. The Match resulted in a 6 all tie - including the two Ladies matches being shared one apiece.

Jim Jeselnick made a presentation to RLGC on behalf of the Golf Heritage Society (USA) and also gave a personal gift to Tudor Williams of a hickory club stamped by Jack Youds, the local professional in the early 20th century.

18 – Open Danish Hickory Championship

On Saturday, May 18 the 8th Open Danish Hickory Championship was con-

tested at the Asserbo Golf Club, northwest of Copenhagen. Sweden's Henrik Peyron (Helsingborg Golf Club) took the championship trophy with a very fine 78. Second was Dennis Willadsen (Ikast Tullamore Golf Club) of Denmark who was only two strokes off Henrik's pace. The men's net winner was Stefan Kjell (Helsingborg Golf Club) of Sweden followed by Claus Maeland (Kongsvinger Golf Club) of Norway.

The ladies net champion was Birgitte Lauber of Germany, followed by Gabriele David, also of Germany and both from the Schloss Langestein Golf Club.

Asserbo golf course is one of the few courses made during World War II. The first holes opened 1944. The course was later extended to nine holes in 1946 and finally to 18 in 1985.

30-April 1– Scottish Hickory Championship

The 35th Scottish Hickory Championship Tour kicked off on Thursday 30th May with a 36-a-side match at Nairn against a Hamish Ewan Steel Select team. Conditions were not good as the rain increased steadily towards the end of the round. Preferred lies were the order of the day. The result was a 10-7 win to the home

side. £100 was donated to Nairn's junior section.

Friday 31st took us East along the Moray coast to Moray New for the Scottish Hickory Championship. The forecast was not good and rain commenced shortly before the first players started at 12.30. However, it was not as heavy as forecast. There was plenty of gorse to test the 45 competitors and preferred lies were again in operation. Henrik Peyron won the scratch prize with a 75 with Jorgen Isberg 2nd on 78 (better inward half) and Ingvar Ritzén 3rd on 78.

Scottish Hickory Champion for 2019 was Englishman David Hall with an excellent net 64 given the wet conditions. 2nd was Olle Dahlgren with a net 66 and 3rd was Chris Kempton on 67.

It was back west along the coast to Hopeman GC for the George Colville Trophy and a dry day at last. Fairways were again bare but no preferred lies. Format was Stableford handicap and stroke-play scratch.

Jorgen Isberg won the scratch with a 77. Second was Henrik Peyron 78 and third Ulf Jagaeus 79. Tony Hunt won the Colville Trophy with 38 points. Secnd was Olle Dahlgren with 34 points (better inward half) and Third Nigel Notley 34 points.

JUNE

7-8 – Czech Hickory Championship

9 – Central England and Seniors Hickory Championships

The BGCS Central England Championship for the Tony Thorp Trophy, Seniors Championship for ages 60+, and John Hanna Tankard for ages 65+ were played at Luffenham Heath GC. Twenty-two BCGS members were joined by guests Dermot

O'Neill (LHGC Men's Captain), Fiona Sharman (LHGC Ladies Captain) and Nick Cunnington (LHGC Assistant Professional). The weather was good and the course in fine condition although a stiff test with hickories as evidenced by the modest scoring.

Claire Johnson mastered the course with an outstanding round and remarkably won both Championships and the John Hanna Tankard with a score of 35 points. Many congratulations to Claire on this unprecedented treble. Best scores behind Claire were Ben Burrows and Mark Wehring with 32 points, John Pearson and Bill Druce with 31 points and Alan Walmsley and Nigel Notley with 30 points. With Claire winning all three trophies the policy of one prize per player had to be rigorously applied. Mark Wehring won the scratch prize with a gross 84.

John Pearson gave a moving tribute to John Hanna who sadly died last December, describing his love of golf and the many contributions he had made to the BGCS over several decades. His obituary can be read in full in the March 2019 issue of *Through the Green*.

JULY

30 – BGCS Captain's Day

Played at Little Aston Golf Club. As the BGCS Open Championship event was postponed until 2020, the Ray Gossage Trophy, normally played for at the Open Meeting, was this year given as a prize at Tony Norcott's Captain's Day, which attracted 33 players. Little Aston was laid out by Harry Vardon in 1908 but, soon afterwards, Harry Colt was brought in to make design changes with particular reference to the bunkering. The course has always featured very highly in the Top 100 in the U.K. and has held and continues to hold prestigious tournaments both amateur and professional. It also has a reputation for its fine and traditional hospitality.

The course is built on sand and gravel which

turned out to be a blessing as on the day the occasional light rainfall was interrupted, a number of times, by heavy rainfall. It is a credit to the course that it absorbed the water and greater credit to all the BGCS members that did likewise. As it transpired, the conditions added to the camaraderie of the event.

Despite the conditions, some excellent scores were recorded with Gavin Bottrell emerging as overall winner of the Captain's prize and the Ray Gossage Trophy with

38 points. The winning hickory score was a "fine" 37 points from Lorne Smith (no "Fine Golf" pun intended).

22 – Swiss Hickory Golf Championship

Rick Adams reports:

The fourth Swiss Hickory Golf Open Championship attracted about three dozen aficionados to the idyllic Alpine mountain village of Davos, Switzerland (site of the famous World Economic Forum each January). At 1,500 meters altitude and with narrow fairways nestled between the mountains and the rail line, accuracy and strategic placement was required.

The 5,469-meter, 130-slope Davos Golf Club was in superb shape, despite heavy rains two days before, though the 16th hole required a temporary green because a landslide of rocks buried the regular putting surface the month previous. During tournament play, a helicopter was performing clean up.

The individual low gross "damen" was Silvia Hefti from Alvaneu Bad, and the low gross "herren" was Felix Meier from Hittnau-Zürich.

Team honors were won by Swiss PGA member Paolo Quirici and Michele Clerici. In the net competition, Nick Hofer and Bernhard Haussener, both of Limpachtal, took the prize. Maurus Lauber, organizer of the event, was low net for the men, and Michèle Lauber took women's net honors.

The 2020 Swiss Hickory championship will be contested across two days next August at Golf Club Lugano, close to the Italian border and Lake Como.

SEPTEMBER

6 – Scotland v. England Hickory Matches

Hamish Ewan reports: Kilspindie Golf Club was the venue for the 2019 Scotland v. England Hickory match. White horses in the Firth, seals basking on the sand banks, blue skies with white puffy clouds and a light breeze... well, three out of four isn't bad. Kilspindie was the venue for the annual hickory match between the auld enemies, always fiercely contested and none more so than this year. Despite a stiff

breeze into the players on the first three/ four holes, there was some good scoring and delicate shots required downwind on fast running greens. The course was in excellent condition and the hospitality first class. New and old friends met and we were pleased to see Archie and Sheila Baird at lunch time. In the evening we were joined by David and Gillian Kirkwood and Gillian very kindly presented the trophy to the win-

6-8 – Polish Hickory Open

Reported by Sofia Lelakowska. The first Polish Hickory Open and traditional tournament Retro Cup took place Sept. 6-8, at Palace Brzezno in Poland. From Friday till Sunday, Retro Festival participants could participate in many attractions in the atmosphere of the 20-30 years of the last century. The hickory tournament was attended, among others, by Christoph Meister, secretary of the European Association of Golf Historians & Collectors. On Saturday, individual tournaments took place and team tournaments were played on Sunday. Over 50 players have played in those four tournaments. Pawel Jaroch is the first winner of Polish Hickory Open, Anthony Kerr won Retro Cup. In the pairs tournament the winners are Janusz Cymanek and Jan Dworzanski – Polish Hickory Open; and Ewa Nosal/Falk Rohmberger in the Retro Cup.

7-9 – German Hickory Championship

Played on the Gera GC in Harth-Pöllnitz. Christoph Meister reports: Fifty-seven players from 10 nations accepted the invitation of the Fürstlicher Hickory Golf Club Reuss and the German Hickory Golf Society to take part in a special championship weekend. The tournament was kicked off with the traditional fourball bestball match Germany vs. Rest of the world. The visitors had their revenge for last year's defeat taking home a clear 6:3 victory over the German side. In the

evening, the participants had the pleasure to follow the invitation of Prince Heinrich XIII Reuss at his hunting lodge, Waidmannsheil, near Saalburg where champagne and food was being served and we all had the opportunity to welcome old and new friends in a true 1920s style.

On the next morning the official tournament was opened by his Highness Prince Heinrich XIII Reuss, honorary chairman of the Fürstlicher Hickory Golf Club Reuss, firing the cannon "Feodora." The third Reuss Hickory Golf Open played on Saturday also counted as first round of the German Open Hickory Championship 2019.

The Silverspoon, a 19th century

Longnose-Spoon, for the winner of the 3rd Reuss Hickory Golf Open was won by BGCS member Alexander Huchel from Munich, who played the relatively short (5,097 meters) but tricky course with 78 strokes using original hickory shafted clubs as replicas were not allowed. In the ladies net category the first prize went to Maria Vrijmood-de Vries from the Netherlands. Vitezslav Hoffmann from Golf Club Ypsilon in the Czech Republic played the golf of his lifetime with only 60 net strokes – a score he will probably remember for a long time.

On day two, Sunday, the players, still inspired and impressed by the events of the days before, found very good playing

conditions and the leaderboard immediately got in motion. At the end, Brian Gee, an English Golf professional based in the Netherlands, prevailed with 146 strokes (75, 71) against German professional Rolf Kinkel from Berlin, who was playing well on day two, adding a 73 to his 79 from the previous day. German-based British professional Glyn Morris defended his third place against the four-time German Hickory Champion and 2010 World Hickory Champion Perry Somers from Australia.

A curious and rare event even in hickory golf took place when Gustavo Barrios Rivas, a Mexican-born golf professional from Amsterdam finished his second round with only three intact clubs. Give these circumstances his 74 on Sunday and a total 5th place are most respectable. There was a total prize money of 5,000 euros for the professionals, gratefully received by them and surely a reminiscence to the prize money of 5,000 gold marks played out during the first German Open of 1911 at Baden-Baden.

At the same time, 32 men played out the German Open Hickory Amateur Champion title. Winner was Alexander Huchel with 161 strokes (78, 83) which got him the "Tanfani di Montalto Cup," a rediscovered amateur cup played out during the 1912 German Open at Baden-Baden. In 1912 the Italian baron had given the trophy to a young British officer named Hugh Gardner Worgan Bradley as an honorary prize.

After 36 holes Huchel was eight strokes ahead of Libor Jirásek, our Czech hickory friend from Karlsbad, followed another five strokes behind by Markus Kümmerle, the two-time German Amateur Hickory Champion, from Schloss Langenstein near Lake Constance. Vitèzslav Hoffmann (Czech Republic) took home men's net classification with a net result of 123 for 36 holes (60 and 63 strokes) though winning a 1931 Ger-

man Open plate which will now reside for 12 months at Vita's Czech Golf Museum in Liberec. At the same time Tatjana Thoss from Wiesbaden took home the ladies net title with 152 strokes.

The 12th German Open Hickory Championship will be played from 14 to 16 August 2020 at Kallin golf course on the outskirts of Berlin. We will again hope to see many international guests.

22-23 – Australian Hickory Shaft Championship

Ross Howard, Australian Golf Heritage Society Captain, reports:

For the first time a national Foursomes event was held in conjunction with the Singles Championship and the weather was kind for the two days at these wonderful and historic Sydney courses. Both Clubs have indicated they were delighted with the events and would welcome a return event in the future.

The Foursomes event was played on Elanora GC on Sept. 22 over 18 holes stroke play. A field of 34 contested the event. Victorian visitors, Richard Macafee and Justin Ryan were the winners on the 1st Foursomes Championship with a scratch score of 83,

leading Rick Baldwin and Tim Sayers (9 & +1) home by a margin of 3 shots.

In the handicap section, winners Peter Monks and Bradley Tatnell (14 & 13) had a fine net 76.5 (gross of 90).

The Championship was played Sept. 23 on Concord GC over 18 holes stroke play. A field of 40 contested the event on the layout recently redesigned by Tom Doak. In the Ladies event, to the delight of the gathering, Kathy Every-Burns (the Concord Lady Captain) was the winner of the Trophy. A first-time winner and the Australian Hickory Shaft Champion for 2019 emerged from the field with Padraic Skehan from Port Kembla shooting a fine scratch score of 82 to win by 2 shots from Richard Macafee and Alex Sutherland (2018 winner).

With the exception of a few heavy showers, the weather was very acceptable and the course was in excellent condition. Winner of the Tony Hawkins Scratch Championship for the second year running was local professional Matthew Holland with the remarkable score of 71 gross. This was two shots better than Matthew's winning score in 2018 and champion. beats the all time record of

72 set by Deal professional Andrew Reynolds.

The Founders Salver and the title of English Hickory Champion is awarded for the best Stableford score. This was won by Jonny Firth from Walton Heath with 39 points against the par of 74 off a handicap of either 8 or 9. On 37 points were the BGCS Vice Captain, Carolyn Kirk and Matthew Holland.

Also of note was the hole-in-one scored by Andrew Buchan on the 14th hole which is believed to be the first such achievement at a U.K.-based hickory championship.

4-6 – Hickory Golf Open in Austria

Played on the golf courses of Kitzbuhel-Schwarzsee and the Golf & County Club Rasmushof.

Tatjana Thoß of Germany and Giunto G. Schalkenberg of Austria report:

Thirty golfers from Germany, Austria, Suisse, France, and Poland celebrated the first Hickory Golf Open Kitzbühel, in Kitzbühel, Austria. On Sunday the players were challenged on the par 3, 9-hole course in the finish area of the most famous ski downhill race, "Der Streif." In the evenings the Kitzbuheler Country Club definitely delivered stylish ambience and a wonderful award ceremony and party. Thanks to sponsors Johnny Walker and Reiters Reserve. Handmade Kitz trophies, wine from our own production and several valuable proper awards were handed to the winners.

22-24 – 15th World Hickory Open

Kilspindie and Gullane No. 2, East Lothian, Scotland

Swede Olle Widegren paved the way on day one after the first round at Kilspindie Golf Club on Tuesday, Oct. 22. Widegren was on top of the leaderboard, at 2 under par, followed by former champion (2017) Fraser Mann, from Scotland, and fellow Brit (and 2015 champion) Andrew Marshall who were both tied with Miguel Carrasco from Spain at 3

over par.

Wednesday's Round Two was at Gullane No. 2, where Widegren maintained his lead by four shots, ahead of Marshall. Defending Champion Johan Moberg was gathering pace and had a stunning second round which put him in third position by the end of the day. Widegren finished the final day with a score of 72 to take the title. His scores of 67, 68 and 72, for a total of 207, are impressive scores. In second place was Marshall followed by defending champion Moberg in third place.

As in past years, the field reflected many of the world's best hickory golfers. Organizers were delighted with entrants from more than a dozen countries. Out of the 130-plus competitors, more than 20 arrived from Switzerland, a country that counts some serious hickory golf experts.

The next largest team was from the USA, led by Mike Stevens, former champ and U.S. hickory champion. In addition, England, led by Andrew Marshall from Norfolk, has been well represented again this year. Other nations entered included both Austria, Denmark, and another half-dozen countries, emphasizing the rapid growth of the game in Europe.

Team Japan won the Archie Baird International Trophy challenge, a team competition sponsored by Swiss Healthcare Performance Group, on Monday at Dunbar Golf Club.

In the Statesman division, Ed Ronco, the president of The Society of Hickory Golfers, garnered the Low Gross with a 92 while Dennis Kerckhove captured the Silver.

There were five Scramble teams, including two from the host club, seven of whom were new to hickory golf. The resident golf professional, John Fisher, invited four young high school golfers from the Lifestyle Junior tour in Michiana to join the scramble. They shot 66, six shots under par. 12-16 – Canadian Open Hickory Championship

Played at the Legends G.C. Sherwood Park, Alberta. The hickory event included a two-day road trip on Monday and Tuesday, Wednesday Scramble, Thursday USA/ Canada match (Ryder Cup format) and Friday Championship tournament.

This year's Wednesday scramble team with a -13 score featured Ken Plaunt, John Collins, Gary Proctor, Fuzz Bazinet and Darcy Riopka. Ken's 3-year-old son, Blake, tagged along to read the putts. After the round, players and other invitees visited a local home for a burger and chicken BBQ, a drink (or two!), lots of tales told and a viewing of a golf memorabilia collection.

Thursday's Casey Cup competition, with Canadian captain Gino Narduzi and U.S. Captain Robb Howard, featured a record number of 56 players. 5-7 – The Wisconsin Hickory Open

Played on The Links course at Lawsonia in Green Lake, Wisc. A field of 32 players entered for 2019. A wet summer produced such thick rough that fairway shots were more than justly rewarded. Friday brought 15-25 mph winds and clouds, and temperatures in the mid 60s for the practice round. Saturday was a sunny, calmer day and the golfers took advantage. Peter Flory took the Open title follwed by Steve Simer. In the Senior Division, what seemed like an unbeatable 7-shot lead with nine holes to go, almost did not hold up for Ken Holtz. George Burgland posted a dazzling 37 on the back to eventually tie Holtz only to lose in a playoff.

Jim Grivven was the Legends Division champion following a three-hole playoff with David Boyd. Anna Bengston was our 2019 Ladies Champion.

6-8 – The McNabb Cup

Played on the Donald Ross-designed Muskegon CC and the Tom Bendelowdesigned White Lake GC. This legendary hickory golf outing continues to build upon both fact and fiction as some reports of the event are hardly to be believed. Best to visit the account provided by that most worthy golf scribe, MacDuff, who was on hand (and largely sober) to witness and verify the events as they unfolded. In brief, near two dozen players girded themselves for this challenge which included 18 holes on Muskegon CC, followed by 18 the following day at White Lake GC, the latter played under Stableford scoring rules. It was a stirring contest in which only one might win the coveted McNabb Cup. This was done, for the first time a repeat McNabb champion, by Bill Ellington. He was followed by Xander Dobreff and Dan Riley. The Cup also rewards those whose medal play is beyond the superlative. Here were Bill Tucholski in first with 79 (scorecard playoff), Scott Staudacher in second, also a 79, and Todd Riker in third with 81.

13-14 – Iowa Hickory Classic

Played on the Hyperion Field Club in Johnston, Iowa, a 1910 Tom Bendelow design. The winning scramble team was Copple, Smeltzer, Hannah, and Hart who turned in a 68.
