On behalf of the Belvedere Club and the Society of Hickory Golfers, we welcome all the contestants of the 2019 U.S. Hickory Open to the Belvedere Golf Club. We are honored to host the 12th U.S. Hickory Open Championship.

Belvedere Golf Club is nearing its 100th anniversary and like so many of the great classic courses created in "Golf's Golden Age," Belvedere has stood the test of time. Architects of the Golden Age produced some of the most innovative, bold & strategic course designs ever built in America. William Watson, a Scotsman from St. Andrews, was one of these bold designers. In 1925, the Belvedere Club's membership hired the renowned architect Watson to design a golf course "worthy of national reputation" and Watson delivered.

Using only a few teams of horses and 125 men, Watson designed a masterpiece that would rival some of his other great designs like Interlachen, Olympic Club, Harding Park, Olympia Fields and Minikahda. A famous sportswriter from St. Louis commented upon Watson's brilliant design at the opening of the club in 1927, "There is a distinct charm in the new course from every point and at all angles and it is questionable whether or not there is another golf course in Michigan that equals in point of beauty, broad perspective, contour and satisfactory surroundings as does the Belvedere Golf Club."

Opened in 1927, the course soon became a respected tournament venue, most notably as a regular host of the Michigan Amateur Championship - 40 times in all. In the 1920's and 1930's, along with hosting many Michigan Amateur Championships, Belvedere hosted the professional Great Lakes Open Championships. Legends such as Walter Hagen, Gene Sarazen, Jock Hutchison, Tommy Armour, and many others all competed at Belvedere for substantial purses.

A new chapter began in 2006, when the Society of Hickory Golfers first competed at Belvedere Golf Club. The Belvedere has enjoyed hosting thirteen Belvedere Hickory Open championships and now we are privileged to host the 2019 U.S. Hickory Open.

In 2016, the original hand-drawn architectural plans of Mr. Watson were discovered in a small building scheduled for demolition in downtown Charlevoix. With the support of the Belvedere Club, a two-year restoration plan returned many of our greens, bunkers and fairways to the style, intent and challenge if the original minimalist period. When dry and firm, the course requires a hickory style ground game – perfectly suited for the U.S. Hickory Championship. Our club treasures its history. Thank you for the opportunity to again give back to our great game.

Enjoy the competition, the fun and the challenge of the Belvedere Golf Club.

Belvedere GC Michigan's Northern Gem

Listen up players, host PGA Professional Dennis Joy knows Belvedere well. What follows is the best advice you will ever get on how to play the course. Pay attention and good luck!

Welcome to Belvedere Golf Club, host of the 2019 U.S. Hickory Open. Designed in 1925 by William Watson, this championship test is a perfect venue for hickory play. At Belvedere, all the greens are accessible in the front for shots played along the ground while greenside bunkers and hazards are positioned left and right to catch errant shots. Fairway bunkers are strategically positioned to make the hickory golfer decide whether to challenge them with a driver or lay-up with a brassie or a spoon.

To play Belvedere Golf Club well, you must be a master of the short game – both putting and chipping. All the greens at Belvedere are the original Watson-designed greens. They have never been remodeled or rebuilt. Watson eases you into your round with four of his first five greens being fairly gentle with subtle movement. But, from hole No. 6 on, things change and both putting and chipping become more challenging. Know this – every putt outside of five feet at Belvedere moves left, right or both.

On the first tee, standing high above the entire front nine, you get a pretty good view of what is ahead of you. Avoid the long heather grasses on the right, and number one looks rather benign. But, as you walk to your second shot, you will notice that number one has the smallest green on the golf course and is perched high above you to a somewhat blind approach shot. Although only the No. 13 handicapped hole on the course, as a starting tournament hole, it gives up few pars and fewer birdies.

There are only three forced carries that traverse the links and they all show up early in the round. Stover Creek cuts through hole numbers 2, 3, and 5 and, although only 10 feet at its widest, the creek is notoriously greedy for golf balls.

The greens on 2 and 3 are examples of those early "gentle and subtle" green contours and both are very large targets. Hole No. 4 is the longest par three on the course and the most difficult. A par here is like gaining a stroke and a half on the field.

Hole No. 5 is a par five and the longest hole on the golf course. There is a sign next to the fairway bunker (on your second shot) that reads "140 Yards to Creek." This is the longest 140 yards in the game of golf. With the prevailing wind blowing at you off Lake Michigan, there is good reason why laying up here might be a sound decision.

The sixth green has the distinction of being the most severe from back to front. Depending on the pin position, a properly struck approach shot may be the difference between a two putt and a four putt. No. 7 also has a demanding approach shot and

usually not a short one. The second par three on the front nine awaits you at No. 8. This is a shortish par three and its green has three distinct levels. Depending on the pin location and the wind, every iron in your bag is in play here.

The front nine closes with a chance to get healthy if you drive the ball well. Avoid O.B. left, the fairway bunkers straight away and the tall grasses right and you might have a reasonable birdie opportunity.

Making the turn to No. 10, it is practical to start thinking about back-to-back birdies. This downhill par 5 is reasonable if you don't drive it right and O.B.



Walking to the eleventh tee is like walking to the eleventh at Augusta National. It is where the test begins. No. 11 is a tough, long par 4 with an uphill and challenging green; make a par here and you are climbing the leaderboard.

Both 12 and 13 require long drives and competent approach shots before you reach their demanding and difficult greens. Playing 11 through 13 well will distinguish you as a contender rather than a "participant."

On the tee at No. 14, you get a break for two holes – but don't fall asleep on them. Birdies at the straightforward No. 14 par three followed by the reachable No. 15 par five are obtainable but, if you relax too much, double bogey can jump up and bite you – and that's embarrassing.

If you have navigated your round successfully enough to get to the 16th tee without being roughed up, prepared to be scared. This inevitably will be the green everyone will talk about after the competition. It has always been so. Championships have been won and lost on the 16th green for decades. Advice, then, from one who has done both: On your practice round hit several shots to the green, both front and back. Good luck – and I mean that.

Number 17 is your final par three and not an easy one. It will play longer than the yardage indicates and don't go left.

Finally, number 18 and the most demanding green on the golf course – but first you must get there. A long drive is necessary to get you into position to what is normally a long approach shot. Off the tee, avoid the tall grasses right and the large tree left, then get creative as you approach the green. ∞





Chuck McMullin, of Gainsville, Va., is a long-time hickory player and a co-founder of the Society of Hickory Golfers. The hickory golf of the 1920s has been reborn at the Belvedere Golf Club. For one thing, the Club's membership is steadfast in their desire to maintain the course as close to William Watson's original 1925 design as possible.

From my first round of golf at the Belvedere I knew this was one of the great hickory golf courses. The contours of the fairways and the green complexes allow for just about every shot in the hickory golf bag. While many modern players watch my bump and run shots with raised eyebrows these shots really

are appropriate on this golf course.

Moreover, they are a lot of fun. If you play hickory golf you will love the Belvedere.

The introduction and growth of hickory golf in Michigan was primarily due to the efforts of the late Ralph Livingston, III, beginning in the mid-1990s. Most of us in the early days of the hickory play revival were collectors. We attended regional and national gatherings of the Golf Collector's Society, now known as the Golf Heritage Society, where we found clubs in abundance.

As the notion of playing with the old clubs spread from the U.K. in the 1980s to the USA in the 1990s it was essential that these old clubs be restored to withstand the rigors of the modern-day golfer's use (and abuse). Several of our collector comrades took to the task of re-conditioning the clubs. Ralph was one of these.

By 2000 a small group of us envisioned several forms of competition with these old hickory clubs on all levels, local, regional, national, and international. During a GCS event in 2000 at Williamsburg, Va., we formed the Society of Hickory Golfers, the focus being on competitive events played with hickory clubs. We established guidelines for uniformity of tournament play, for the golf clubs, the golf courses, and even the preferred attire.

In Michigan a hickory event was first played at the Kingsley Club near Traverse City in 2003. The event was moved to the Belvedere Golf Club in 2006 and was thereafter named the Belvedere Hickory Open (BHO). The event in the first few years attracted some 30 players. The Belvedere membership enjoyed the event from the beginning and within a season or two several members could be seen on the links with their own eclectic group of playable old hickory clubs. Local golfers soon tried this refreshing type of golf as well.

Under Belvedere Professional Marty Joy's direction the BHO has expanded to some 60 players annually, the 13th BHO being held last summer. In those early years a lot of the

social gatherings at tournament time were hosted on a volunteer basis. Jan, my wife, and I had a Thursday night cocktail party at our condo for the first few years until the number of attendees overwhelmed the space. As tournament attendance increased social functions were elevated to become a near-essential part of the overall event experience. These social gatherings are the cornerstone of all tournaments. The BHO is near the top of everybody's list of favorite hickory events held around the country, not only for the outstanding golf course, but also for the lively social gatherings during the event.

I have now played the Belvedere Hickory Open every summer since that first visit in 2006 and each year brings several new recruits to hickory play. It is very gratifying to see some three dozen Belvedere members and local players playing with old hickory clubs, not just at tournament time, but often throughout the season on this magnificent venue. The enthusiasm for hickory golf at the Belvedere is at a level second to none.

If there is anything I can do, personally, to enhance your hickory experience during your visit to the Belvedere Golf Club, please don't hesitate to ask. Do avail yourselves of the social functions each day. Enjoy the

scenery both on the golf course and around the city of Charlevoix and, of course, the playing of "the goff." ∞

"The Hickory 100"

One of the unique features of the Charlevoix County Junior Golf program (CCJG) is the annual fundraising event called The Hickory 100. Begun 11 years ago by retired Belvedere Professional Steve Braun, the event comprises 100 consectutive holes of golf with all funds raised benefiting the CCJG.

Current Belvedere PGA Professional Dennis "Marty" Joy, has continued the concept adding his own unique passion – all holes are played with hickory clubs. In over 1,100 holes of golf to date, he has never lost a ball. On top of that, he once carded a 69 for an 18-hole segment during the day, which usually begins at 6:30 a.m.

Monies raised pay for season passes for the youth to play the Charlevoix Municipal Golf Course, scholarships for individuals to attend golf camp at Ferris State University, end-ofseason prizes and awards for the Junior Golf Champions and Skills Champions, and to keep the annual participation fee for the entire CCJG summer program to a mere \$50! (Where else can you get more than 13 hour-long golf lessons, teaching all components of the game, for a mere fifty dollars?)

The CCJG program teaches glf fundamentals and foundations in positive character, to more than 75 children ages 8-17 each summer. Lessons are taught at four local courses including Belvedere Golf Club, Charlevoix Country Club, the City of Charlevoix Municipal Course, and Antrim Dells. A typical lesson lasts an hour and consists of three 20-minute segments teaching the full golf swing, a putting lesson, and a chipping and/or pitching lesson.

Over the past 11 years, "The Hickory 100" has raised over

\$110,000 for junior golf. The positive impact that Marty has on the youth of the Charlevoix community will be felt for years to come, thanks to his kindness and the generosity of those who continue to support the program.


