We are grateful to the various scribes of the British Golf Collectors Society and other European and Australian/Asian hickory organizers whose reports on several championships were the basis for the following brief summaries. This is our 20th year of reporting on global hickory golf events. All tournament directors across the world are invited to send us their reports for inclusion in this summary. The report is not meant be exhaustive. We cannot possible include every hickory golf outing that occurs; rather, we hope to offer a precis of such national contests and hickory opens that have a large regional influence. Our apologies in advance for any omissions or errors in reporting. We have done our best to work with regional tournament directors to compile the following report.

13 - BGCS v Royal Worlington

To prove that inclement weather will not stop a BGCS match, please see the attached from our recent match against Royal Worlington. No result was recorded. The lunch that followed the golf was, as always, superb and we thank Nigel Notley for organising the fixture which followed one the previous day at Flempton which was, although we did not know it at the time, played in relatively good weather.

13 - NZ Hickory Open

Peter van Eekelen reports:

The 2023 New Zealand Hickory Open had a stellar beginning with an opening competition for the Anzac Flask, a team event between New Zealand and Australia. With a USHO champion, Alan Grieve, and three Australian hickory champions on the Australian team it was always going to be a big ask for New Zealand, but the result was a tightly fought match with Australia the victors 108 vs 110. The day concluded with the Australian team having an intimate one-on-one with Sir Bob Charles, 1963 Open Champion, in the Charles room at the Christchurch Golf Club.

Sir Bob is one of the key people leading the renaissance of hickory golf in New Zealand. The NZ Hickory Open is a testament to his belief that hickory golf is the game for the people. As member of the NZ Hickory Open committee, he was key in setting up the course to represent the historical significance of Prestwick's 12 hole

As for the New Zealand Hickory Open, the day opened with 12-year-old bagpiper Oscar Browitt piping in the day and international players being driven to the starting area in vintage cars. Sir Bob took honors, followed in second by Mark Larson and Catherine Bell in third. "It was a special moment seeing Sir Bob receive the coveted NZ Hickory Open Trophy," van Eekelen said.

31-April 2 - BGCS Welsh Weekend

Windy drizzle and pale sunshine for the 2023 Welsh Weekend at Borth and Ynyslas GC on March 31. The best individual score was by Ian Hislop, with 39 Stableford points, followed by Howard Plush on 37 and then Ulf Jagaeus also on 37. Mikael Martinsson had the best scratch score on 80, one ahead of Ulf, while the best team score was 80 points, by Athole Marshall, Erik Brandstrom and Tomas Bjorkman. Aberdovey was played in warm sunshine. Sunningdale adjustments kept all matches close. For the second successive year, the match ended in a tie in terms of aggregate holes up. Neil Gascoigne reprised his efforts of 2022 with a remarkable 73 in the Welsh Hickory Championship the following day, to win the Scratch Cup, a full four shots ahead of his nearest rival, Jorgen Isberg. Jenny Hunt won the ladies prize with an excellent 31 points, while the 2023 Welsh Hickory Champion was Jason Dolman, with a remarkable 40 points.

APRIL

2 – South Australian Hickory Championship

Andrew Baker reports:

Early April 2023 saw the inauguration of the two-day South Australian Hickory Shaft Championships. Preceded by state hickory championships in Queensland, Tasmania, and New South Wales, the South Australian Hickory Shaft Championships

are the fourth state-level championships to exist. The foursomes championship was held Sunday 2 April at Victor Harbor Golf Club, followed by the individual championship

at The Royal Adelaide Golf Club the next day. Both events were played on cloudless autumn days with temperatures in the mid-twenties.

The individual championship was contested by 16 players. The winner, with an exceptional round of 79 off-the-stick, was Bendigo Golf Club (Vic) 2-marker Justin Ryan. He outplayed PGA professional from Sydney's Eastlake Golf Club (NSW), Alex Sutherland, by a solitary stroke. In third place was Lang Lang Golf Club (Vic) member Stephen 'Mango' Maguire.

The individual handicap event was won by Ross Haslam from Nudgee Golf Club (Qld) with a score of 77 playing from a handicap of 14, followed by Alex Sutherland with 80 strokes playing off scratch. The youngest player in the field, local Glenelg Golf Club (SA) member Nick Lambos, was one shot further back.

On the previous day, the long and tree-lined Victor Harbor Golf Club layout provided a strenuous test of foursomes golf. Played in the Canadian variation of the game, the winners were Justin Ryan from Bendigo Golf Club (Vic) and Terry Thornton from The Royal Adelaide Golf Club (SA) with an off-the-stick score of 83. They finished five strokes ahead of Royal Queensland Golf Club (Qld) pairing Ross Bishop and Bradley Tatnell. Third place was won on countback by Queenslanders Philip Akes and Ross Haslam who finished one stroke further behind.

The 2023 Season - Hickory Golf in Japan

Alex Bruce reports: The year 2023 was the best year ever for hickory golfers in Japan. We had four major events and the first official PGA Hickory Golf twoday tournament for professional golfers.

The first major event in April was The Japan Hickory Golf Championship event at Kobe Golf Club. The winners

were: Champion, Ryuji Asano; Ladies Champion, Hiromi Aratani; and Senior Champion , Hisashi Aratani. The Japan Hickory Golfing Society hosted this event.

The second major event in June was The Japan Hickory Golf Masters event at Taiheiyo Golf Club Yachiyo Course. The winners were: Champion Scott Nakase, Ladies Champion, Jun Yamamoto, and Senior Champion Kazuhiko Kawamoto. Taiheiyo Golf Club hosted this event.

The third major event in December was The Ladies and Gentlemen Hickory Golfers Friendship Championship at Naruo Golf Club. The winners were: Champion Yuji Yasuda, Ladies Champion Mariyo Miyam oto, and Senior Champion Akira Fujiwara. The Japan Hickory Golfing Society hosted this event.

The fourth major event in December was The Japan Hickory Classic Open at Ono Golf Club. The Japan Hickory Golfers Club hosted this event.

The fifth major event was the PGA official Hickory Golf two-day tournament, with results reported under the DECEMBER heading.

MAY

27 - Open Danish Hickory Championship

The 10th annual Danish Open Hickory Championship was played at the Royal Copenhagen Golf Club. Christian Joel, president of the Danish Golf Historical Society, reports that that 39 players were entered, including players from Sweden, Switzerland, Germany and Norway. "All in all a wonderful day in the most fantastic summer weather. The Royal Copenhagen Golf club was really at its best, fast greens, okay fairways and not too much rough. As the course is inside the Queen's hunting grounds there are many regulations regarding what is possible in respect of maintenance etc." Congratulations to Andreas Olsen, the overall winner and to

17-19 - Scottish Hickory Championship

First day was a visit to Gullane 3 for the Colville Memorial trophy. Fortytwo golfers teed off seeking to get their name on the famous trophy. The winner was Per Nyman with an excellent 2 over 69. The 2023 winner of the Colville Trophy was Björn Petersson with 43 points. Second day was across Aberlady Bay to Craigielaw GC to play for the inaugural Czeslaw Kruk Memorial Quaich. The sun was occasionally shining with a light westerly breeze as the 37 golfers started their rounds. Scratch winner for the second day was Per Nyman with a sub par 70. The winner of the Quaich was captain Bob Chadwick with a sensational 45 points. The third day was an even shorter trip to Kilspindie GC for the 39th Scottish Championship as Kilspindie is literally over the fence from Craigielaw. 47 golfers had another fine day with virtually no wind. A rare day indeed. Scratch winner for

JUNE

4 – BGCS Central England Hickory Championship

This event, which also includes the BGCS Seniors Championship and John Hanna Tankard, was staged at Luffenham Heath GC. The weather was fine, the course in superb condition. The winner was Claire Johnson with a score of 37 points. Winner of the BGCS Seniors Championship for aged 60+ was Howard Plush also with a score of 37 points. Claire Johnson won the John Hanna Tankard for aged 70+. The Scratch prize was won by

15-16 – Liermoen Hickory Invitational

AUGUST

5-6 - Swedish Hickory Championship

The 20th Swedish Hickory was played on the Växjö Golfklubb. Per G Nyman was the winner, his third Swedish Hickory Championship. He also won in 2009 and 2010. Madeleine Tham Johansson won the ladies Championship on her first try, and Lars Norén won the seniors (65+) competition.

73 gentlemen, nine la-

dies and 15 seniors entered the Championship, played in Växjö in southern Sweden. It is a stroke play competition, scratch over two rounds. Players who do not make the cut after 18 holes can play in Svenska Hickorykannan, a handicap stroke play competition on the second day.

Per G Nyman returned an impressive score, two under par, even though players suffered in heavy rain on the second day. He was all of nine strokes ahead of former

champion Johan Moberg and David Kirkham. The 2024 Swedish Hickory Championship will be played at Lundsbrunn Golfklubb on 3–4 August. Lundsbrunn is situated in southern Sweden.

10-12 – Canadian Hickory Open

During the second weekend of August 2023 a total of fifty-nine hickory golfers from eight nations met during three days at Golf Club Rhein-Main in Wiesbaden to crown the 2023 German Open Hickory Champion. The

Hickory Scramble on Friday was won by the Team from the Czech Republic consisting of Andrea Hoffmannová, Vita Hoffmann, Libor Jirasek and Dalibor Pro-chazka though securing the Trophy of the Honorary Secretary. For the 36-hole stroke play championship played on Saturday and Sunday the par-72 course in the Hessen state capital Wiesbaden with its differences in elevation, slopes and tricky greens proved to be a real test also demanding every player fit-ness.

The ladies title and the 2019 Lily-Trophy was secured by 15-year-old Marie Kauder from Golf- und Land-Club Berlin-Wannsee with 177 strokes for thirty-six holes ahead of the five-time title holder, Sweden's Britta Nord from Bro-Balsta with 192 strokes.

The gentlemen's competition proved to be much closer. After a very close finish, 16-year-old Louis Dudzus (Golf- und Land-Club Berlin-Wannsee) won with 152, one stroke ahead of Australian professional Perry Somers and former European Tour Player Heinz-Peter Thül (both 153 strokes). Louis became the proud winner of the historic Tanfani-di-Montalto trophy dating from 1912. The "hickory junior golfer" had already secured the title of German Amateur Hickory Amateur Hickory Champion in 2020 and 2021 finishing the competition as the best Amateur player.

The 2024 German Open Hickory Championship will be played Aug. 16-18 at Royal Homburg Golf Club near Frankfurt, which celebrates its 125th club anniversary in 2024. For information, please check http://www.german-hickory.com

The professionals played individual scratch mode and the amateurs played scramble in teams of four. Among the more than 40 players were members of the Basozabal club, from other clubs throughout Spain and four players from the Austrian golf team. In the middle of the tour, we tasted knife-cut ham courtesy of Torres Cortés accompanied by wines from the Rioja Ramón Bilbao winery, Mahou beers, San Miguel beers, Solan de Cabras water and at the end of the tour Gin Tonic based on Martin Miller's. And as the culmination of the day, the magician Aitor delighted us with his magic tricks.

The 28th playing of the Australian Hickory Shaft Championship was played on Melbourne's world renowned sand belt courses. Hickory players from around Australia, as well as, for the first time, contingents from New Zealand and Japan, competed for the Championship and handicap trophies.

The new Sandy Links course hosted the Foursomes on Day 1. The weather was

superb and the course was in great condition. There were some fine scores and with an excellent 72, New Zealanders Catherine Palmer and Mark Lawson took home the trophy. Runners up were Mike Clayton/Terry Thornton on 76. Darryn Watt/ Andrew Baker won the handicap section with Net 70.6.

The main Championship event was played over 36 holes with round one at Woodlands GC and the final round at Kingston Heath GC.

Players braved the conditions, some recording excellent scores. The early start for the final round at Kingston Heath was bleak, cold, and wet, but as one player noted "these are the conditions they play in all the time in Scotland!!" and nothing could deter playing on one of the world's best courses. A superb second round of 74 by Richard Macafee giving him a record low of 148, secured the Men's Championship Trophy over NSW's Tim Sayers on 162.

In the Women's Championship, the first day at Woodlands was New Zealand's Catherine Palmer's first full round with hickory clubs, but she didn't let that stop her from taking the title with an impressive score of 169. The handicap section was a close contest with Justin Ryan on 154 edging out Mango Maguire on 155.

The inaugural Asia Pacific Hickory Championship, sponsored by the Society of Hickory Golfers (SoHG) was played in conjunction with the Australian event. Richard Macafee and Catherine Palmer continued their winning ways to claim the men's and women's titles. Australia won the Teams Event.

5-8 - BGCS Hickory Grail

The 13th edition was played at Belvedere Golf Club, Charlevoix, Michigan, USA. The tricky William Watson design, from 1925, was in sublime condition albeit being a bit green and lush with very true and fast greens. Wednesday's matches were abbreviated by thunder and lightning. Some matches were cancelled and resscheduled to the following day. Team USA won the foursomes 51/2-11/2. Team USA also won the fourballs session by 4-3 making the total 91/2-41/2 going into Friday singles. On Friday, the USA team took the singles 8½-5½ making the final score 18-10. After three consecutive European wins, Team USA won the Grail, making the total match series score 7 - 6 to USA. The 14th Hickory Grail is scheduled for Rya GK, Helsingborg, Sweden, in mid-September 2025.

OCTOBER

5-6- English Hickory Championship - Rye GC

A large field of 48 competed in the England vs. The World match on the Jubilee Course in excellent autumn weather on the Thursday, with The World coming out on top 8-4. This was followed for the first time by a champagne reception in the Clubhouse and a dinner in the Dining Room, a very rare occurrence at Rye. Friday on the Old Course was a stern test. Only the winner

Played over four courses in Ayrshire, Scotland. The Archie Baird Trophy team event was held on the Dundonald Links Golf Course. This event is a four-person team event with two better ball scores to count, one from each pair. The team from Japan took the honors with 87 points – Yoshihiro Okubo, Ryuji Asano, Kazuyo Hasegawa, and Khoruko Hagaya. Over the next three days, the field was split into groups to play Prestwick Golf Club, Western Gailes, and Kilmarnock Barassie. Ollie Widegren (Sweden) finished as top professional (240); Katsuyoshi Nakashima (Japan) was the top senior (over 50) at 256; and Deal Hudson (U.S.A.) was the Honorable 70 Champion with 270. The top amateur was Jarmo Maunu (Finland) with 243; the men's amateur net champ was Bruce Collins (Australia) with 197. The Ladies champion with 299 was Tatjana Thos (Germany). The Ladies net champion was Rie Mitsuhasi (Japan) with 235.

13-15 – Swiss Hickory Open Championship

Played at Golfclub Lugano. The field featured almost 90 players from eight countries and almost a dozen former and upcoming professionals, led by former Italian Ryder Cup player Costantino Rocca, the Austrian DP world tour player Markus Brier, the French European tour member and current senior tour player Raphael Jaquelin, and the Swiss hickory golf legend Paolo Quirici. The



player field was extended by a selection of strong amateurs.

The golf club Lugano, celebraing its 100th anniversary this year, was the ideal host. The golf course was in superb condition and challenged the players with lightning fast greens and tough pin positions.

The four headliners of the tournament scored within four shots on the first day. Local professional and multiple Swiss Champion Paolo Quirici bested the rest of the field with a brillant level par final round and a total score of +1 to once again claim the title. The large ladies field was led by Carmen Sagarra from Golfclub Niederbüren, who claimed the title after a tie with Szilvia Karpati at 25 Brut Points.

A great highlight of the event was the opening Skins game that featured Costantino Rocca, Markus Brier, Raphael Jaquelin and the rising Swiss professional Fiorino Clerici. The old master and Ryder Cup legend Rocca showed some magic hands on the last green where he holed a 12-footer for birdie and secured a large part of the prize pot of 5'000 CHF.

They were followed by a large number of spectators all in good old-fashioned clothes, large camaraderie in an enchanting atmosphere.

DECEMBER

8-9 – Japanese PGA Hickory Golf Tournament

Alex Bruce reports: The PGA Hickory Golf Tournament Taiheiyo Club Cup 2023, Japan's first PGAsanctioned hickory golf tournament (total prize money 8 million yen) was held at the Taiheiyo Club Yachiyo



Course. The tournament was played with hickory shafted golf clubs; all players wore knickerbockers.

Norio Shinozaki won the tournament with an even-par score of 144 over the two days to collect the 500,000 yen first-place prize money. The Best Amateur Award went to Scott Nakase, a member of the Taiheiyo Club, who shot a 77.

At the award ceremony, the president of Taiheiyo Club Corporation, Mr. Shun Han, announced, "We are determined to continue this tournament for the next ten years," to the delight of all the hickory golf players.

JANUARY

21-22 – Winter Park Hickory Classic – Winter Park GC, Winter Park, Fla.

A full field took to the historic 1914 Winter Park 9, listed as one of the top ten 9-hole golf courses in the United States. The two-day event, Jan. 21-22, consisted of 18 holes on day one and nine holes where only four clubs were allowed on day two. On Monday, Feb. 21, for the U.S. Professional & Amateur Hickory Golf Championships, South Carolina's Mark Harman broke through with a score of 76 to capture the John Shippen Cup, named in honor of America's first golf pro. Winter Spring's Eddie Peckels won the Oscar Bunn Trophy as top amateur for the second consecutive

year with an even par 72. Bill Geisler also of Winter Springs took home the Heritage Trophy with a net 68, edging out Peter Herrington of the Villages by a single shot.

24-26 – The Arizona Desert Hickory Classic

Played on the Grandview & Pebblebrook Golf Courses. Playing pre-1935 hickory shafted clubs, 99 players came from across the USA and Canada, and a few international contestants. Among the various honors and prizes, tournament host Ken Holtz awarded the annual Willie Noble Humanitarian Award to Cal and Janet Whitman for their efforts in promoting hickory golf around the world.

This year, 100 years later, the sounds of hickory clubs echoed again over the storied course on which Bobby Jones outlasted Bobby Cruickshank in 1923 for his first U.S. Open title.

In 2023, it would be a young assistant pro from The Greenbrier in White Suphur Springs, W. VA. who would take the title. Matthew Hoffman's two-day total of 146 (73-73) was eight clear of his next competitor, Grant Raffel of Palo Alto, Calif. In 1923, Jones was tied with Cruickshank after regulation play, and beat the Scotsman by two strokes in a playoff the following day, largely on the strength of a miracle shot on the 18th hole.

On the net side of things in the current competition, Richard Boggs of Sanford, Fla., secured the Open Division Net title with a net 138. James Ciganek, the 2022 USHO champion from the Mission Inn in Florida, followed him with a net 141. Ciganek's gross score of 153 won him the John Fischer Low Amateur award.

Jane Pohlman of Omaha, Neb., took the women's USHO title with a 162 to nip Rylee Stovall (Litchfield Park. Ariz.), the 2022 champion, by one stroke. Betty Hayden of Middleburg, Fla., was the net champ with a 140 (178 gross).

Mike Callahan of Michigan is the Senior Division winner. His 151 (76-75) was four clear of Canadian Hugh Cameron. The Senior Net victor was Michael O'Donnell of Newtown, Pa., with 125 (169 gross); followed by Richard Schmidt of N. Kingston, R.I. with 136 (170 gross).

In the Super Senior Division it was the SoHG's own David Brown of Omaha, Neb., who posted 166 (81-85) for the title. The daring Miss Minoprio would play only one club, a hickory-shafted cleek.

The full field – men and ladies – played from the same tees, which were a blend of the course's red and white tee boxes, at just under 2,500 yards. Top honors went

to Kit Ledbetter, from Lopez Island, who shot a remarkable even par for the round, with three birdies. Second place went to club pro, Gabriel Tonan, at four-over.

Shout out to 11-year-old Silas Kane who competed for the first time with a hickory club in his first year playing golf. He's already had a modern golf hole in one.

16 - MHS Steam Shovel

30-Oct. 1 - Ontario Open Hickory Golf Championship

Played over the Whirlpool Golf Course and the Sawmill Golf Course. The Golf Historical Society of Canada's Fall Hickory Classic was renamed this year, but played on the same golf courses. The folowing is a report from George Supol, GHSC Hickory Ambassador: A total of 41 players attended, including 28 two-day players and 13 one-day players. Of the two-day players, there were four U.S. players and one player who made the trip from Alberta. Last year's Fall Classic was the precursor to the new Championship. Divisions included: Open (age 54 and younger), Senior (age 55-69), Legends (age 70+) and Ladies. Two-day players competed for the overall championship and silver and bronze gross and net divisional medals. One-day players also competed for separate gross and net silver and bronze divisional medals plus some picture prizes. All players were eligible to compete for closest-to-the-pin prizes

on the days they played.
